ADOBE REVIVAL

- Earthen materials such as adobe mud brick or masonry and stucco imitations.
- Natural, earth colors outside and inside.
- Massive wood roof and ceiling beams, porch posts and doors.
- Flat or gently sloping roofs.
- Wall and roof parapet.
- Thick round-edged walls









BUNGALOW

- Small size
- Usually appears to be small
- Balance. The front of a bungalow doesn't have to be symmetrical, but it often presents balanced proportions.
- Open floor plans.
- Large front porch with eaves.
- Dormer windows.









CAPE COD

- Symmetrical appearance with a centered front entry
- Steep roofs with side gables and an overhang
- Shingle siding
- Gabled dormers
- Double-hung windows with shutters
- Centralized chimneys
- Simple exterior ornamentation









COLONIAL

- Two to three stories never one story
- Symmetrical facade
- Symmetrical floor plans
- Decorative entryways
- Pitched Roofs
- Chimneys
- Multi-paned windows









CRAFTSMAN

- Covered front porch
- Low-pitched, gabled roof with decorative supports
- Tapered columns
- Double hanging windows
- Dark wood built ins and details inside
- Style and rail doors and cabinets









DUTCH COLONIAL

The most notable feature of a Dutch Colonial house is its broad, double-pitched roof that slopes fairly flat and wide at the top and then changes angles and slopes almost straight down, often with narrow dormer windows integrated into the roofline.









ENGLISH COTTAGE

- Thatched Roofs
- Half-timbered (stone on the first floor timber on the second
- Leaded Windows
- Bargeboard or Vergeboard carved wood projecting from the gables of a roof
- Stacked Chimneys
- English Gardens









FOURSQUARE

- Simple floor plan
- Boxy, cubic shape
- Full width front porch with columnar supports and wide stairs
- Offset front entry in an otherwise symmetrical facade
- Two to two and a half stories
- Pyramidal, hipped roof, often with wide eaves
- Large central dormer
- Large single light windows in front, otherwise double hung
- Incorporated design elements from other contemporaneous styles, but usually in simple applications









GREEK REVIVAL

- Exterior stone-like materials
- White exterior walls
- Sash windows
- Elaborate front entrance
- Low-pitched roof shape
- Columns and pilasters
- Entablature roof trim
- Interior moldings
- Expressive detailing
- Porticos







LOG HOMES

Made of logs









MID-CENTURY MODERN

- Exposed structure
- Minimal ornamentation
- Natural materials
- Privacy for occupants
- Flat or minimal sloped roofs
- Large windows in the rear of the home









MEDITERANEAN

- Red-tiled roof (usually terra cotta),
- Brick or stucco, often painted in neutrals
- Stone details
- Carved wood doors
- Raw iron and metalwork on windows, over balconies, and front doors









MODERN FARMHOUSE

- White exterior
- Metal roof
- Many windows
- Barn style lighting
- Large covered porch
- A framed roof
- Carriage style garage doors
- Modern address numbers









NORTHWEST CONTEMPORARY

- Extensive use of unpainted wood in both interiors and exteriors
- Integration of the building with its setting
- Asymmetrical floor plans and facades
- Extensive use of glass extending to the floor
- Low-pitched or flat roof of shingles
- Overhanging eaves
- Minimal decoration
- It is sometimes known as Northwest Modern









RANCH (RAMBLER)

- Asymmetrical
- Spreading, horizontal orientation
- Hipped or gabled roof often with wide eaves
- Logical, open floor plan in a rectangular, L-, or Ushaped configuration
- Minimal ornamentation
- Good quality construction using natural materials
- Attached garages
- Sliding glass doors,
- Large plate glass picture windows,
- Formica countertops often updated with stone









SPLIT LEVEL

- Multi-level with a low-pitched roof
- Deep-set eaves
- Horizontal rectangular or L-shaped orientation
- Asymmetrical facade
- Double hung windows, large picture window, sliding glass doors to patio
- Integrated garage
- Simple, open floor plans with minimal wasted space
- Natural materials including hardwood floors, wood and brick exterior
- Minimal decoration limited to porch roof supports and brackets, shutters









TUDOR

- One-and-one-half to two stories
- Asymmetrical plan
- Cross-gabled, medium to steeply pitched roof, sometimes with clipped gables
- Half-timbering
- Arrangements of tall, narrow windows in bands; small window panes either doublehung or casement
- Over scaled chimneys with decorative brickwork and chimney pots
- Cozy, irregularly-shaped rooms









VICTORIAN

ALL

- Steep, gabled roofs
- dormers
- Shapely windows, especially bay windows
- Stained glass
- Decorative woodwork
- Bright colors
- Asymmetry

QUEEN ANNE:

- Rounded elements
- Towers, turrets
- Covered wrap around porches
- Highly decorated

STICK ITALIANATE:

- Long Vertical elements simpler in design
- Tall skinny windows

EDWARDIAN:

- Closely preceded craftsman
- Most masculine of the three
